From the Archives

Memorial plaques were issued after the First World War to the next-of-kin of all British and Empire service personnel who were killed as a result of the war.


The plaques were made of bronze and were popularly known as the "Dead Man's Penny", because of the similarity in appearance to the somewhat smaller penny coin. A total of 1,355,000 plaques were issued, which used a total of 450 tonnes of bronze and continued to be issued into the 1930s to commemorate people who died as a consequence of the war.

Before Christmas, an anonymous donor contacted myself offering the Memorial Plaque for Benjamin Hogg of Corstorphine Hill Farm. Benjamin was a Private in the 1st Lovat Scouts; he died on the 30th of May 1916 in Egypt, and is buried in the Cairo War Memorial Cemetery.

I was delighted to accept this on behalf of The Corstorphine Trust and the plaque now sits in pride of place in our museum.

After his death in 1916, Benjamin's family continued to live at Corstorphine Hill Farm. His father, James, a Farm Servant, his Mother Jessie, a sister Elizabeth a Chemical Worker, a sister Nellie also a Chemical Worker, a brother Samuel who was a Green Keeper at Corstorphine Golf Club, a brother Alexander who was a plumber with T. W Beach, Plumber and a sister Jessie who was a Tapestry Worker with the Scottish Folk Fabric Company.

Remembering Eric Davidson

We were sorry to hear that Eric Davidson, our Honorary President from 2004 - 2019, had passed away at the beginning of December.

Eric was educated at Musselburgh Grammar School where he was captain of both cricket and rugby. His keen interest in sport continued throughout his life and he was a member of Turnhouse Golf Club.

On leaving school he started his apprenticeship in the office of the architect and builder Sir James Miller and, at the same time, started a part time course at the School of Architecture, part of the Edinburgh College of Art.



He continued until he was called up for military service in 1946 where he served with the Royal Engineers in the 8th Field Squadron (1st armoured Division) seeing active service in Palestine until 1947. He was then stationed in Egypt and Kenya until he was demobbed in 1948.

Returning to Edinburgh, he recommenced his studies at Edinburgh College of Art as a full time student and, after receiving the Andrew Grant Travelling Bursary, travelled to Spain, France and Italy. He graduated in 1954 and worked for a couple of different offices before joining the Architect's Department of the South East Regional Hospital Board in 1955 to pursue his interest in health buildings and hospital architecture in the developing NHS.

Over the years, Eric rose through the ranks and in 1985 he became Director of the Scottish Health Service Building Division with responsibility for the Scottish Health Service Capital Programme, the post from which he retired in 1989.

Throughout his career, Eric had several articles published in various journals (https://historic-hospitals.com/tag/modernism/; https://portal.historicenvironment.scot/designation/LB52537)

After he retired, he was instrumental in the rehabilitation and conversion of The Dower House on behalf of The Corstorphine Trust in 1991 with the official opening held in April 1992 and the external renovation (Phase 2) of The Dower House finishing in May 1999.

He and his wife June were married in 1956 and moved to Corstorphine in 1964. Family caravaning holidays in the UK were the order of the day but they did travel abroad once to Denmark.

For those of us who knew him, Eric had a great sense of humour and he kept this right until the end.

He is survived by their four children: Iain, Stuart, Suzie and Laura.

Corstorphine Posada

We, along with various other local organisations, were invited by Esther Elliott, Community Chaplain at Corstorphine Old Parish to take part in a posada.

Las posadas is a Mexican tradition in which the journey of Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem is reenacted.

We received the figurines from Corstorphine Primary School pupils and, after taking a photograph of them in the museum, we then

handed the figurines onto Corstorphine library where they continued their journey around the village.

Corstorphine Trust Remembrance Day Services 2023

On Friday 10 November 2023, children from primary and secondary schools in the Corstorphine area assembled with their teachers and head teachers at the war memorial in Kirk Loan. In what is becoming a regular event they arrived just before 11:00 to take part in an act of remembrance to commemorate the men of Corstorphine who died in the various conflicts of the 20th century.



The service was led by the minister of the Old Parish Church, Moira McDonald, who opened the

commemoration with a short introduction followed by the two minutes silence. She then talked to the children about the meaning of the commemoration and why it is important to remember those men whose names are on the memorial. She also referred to the importance of the memorials, not only in Corstorphine but throughout the county and what they mean to people in an area and the need for them to be respected.

As happened last year, some of the pupils from Craigmount High School who are members of the pipe band played a number of tunes before and after the event. Pupils from some of the other schools also read out poems that they had written.

After Moira had finished she invited the children to come forward and lay their wreaths along with any cards they had written. At the same time the teachers present encouraged the children to look at the names and think about who they were.

One of the schools had carried out a project into some of the men whose names are recorded on the memorial. There were a number of short notes describing them, their family ties to Corstorphine and a brief account of their military service. Also a number of men were commemorated with a poppy being attached next to the person's name on the memorial.

The feedback from the schools following the earlier school commemorations has been positive and is something they wish to participate in in future years. I hope that in the future the school remembrance event is something that may develop with more participation from the children.

With 2024 being the 110th anniversary of the outbreak of WWI it has been suggested that the schools, in conjunction with The Corstorphine Trust, repeat the 2014 memorial event. At that commemoration, individual crosses for each of the names on the war memorial were laid by the children. It is hoped that some details of each of those commemorated will be investigated and recorded by the children involved.

As well as the children, some of their parents and other members of the public also attended.

Sunday 12 November was Remembrance Day and again, the day dawned bright and sunny with only light cloud present during the service. Although a number of those who have attended the memorial service for many years are no longer able to take part, there still seems to be a desire from people to participate and lay a commemorative wreath.

Just before 11:00 a Colour Party, led by Kevin Aitchison, and formed from members of the local Air Cadets, Scouts and Guides lined up behind the war memorial.



At the same time, the minister of the Old Parish Church, the Reverend Moira McDonald, led her congregation out and officiated at the service.

Following the two minute silence, with the end marked by the bugler and piper, Moira led the service in prayer before inviting those with wreaths to come forward in turn to lay them at the base of the memorial. During the playing of the pipes a slight breeze caused the leaves on one of the trees in the churchyard to shed its leaves in a scene reminiscent of the falling poppy petals seen during the RBL Service of Remembrance held at the Albert Hall each year.



The service finished with the customary blessing and an invitation to all those attending to participate in the service being held in the church for the uniformed youth organisations.

As in previous years, a good sized crowd attended the event. The feeling is that the service is attracting numbers similar to those seen before the pandemic in 2020.

My thanks go to all those who helped both before the event and on the day. Stewards, first-aiders, photographer, the colour party participants, police and those laying wreaths.

Particular mention must go to the staff of the roads department for organising the road closure and for the work of the team-leader who was able to arrange for the team carrying out white-lining to be off-site for the duration of the service.


